

Another scheduled meeting was held on March 19 at the Municipality of Indang and was participated in by the Association of Barangay Captains (ABC) President Constancio S. Telmo, Jr. and Tourism Consultant Mr. Vernie A. Caisip. The extension team of DIT composed of Prof. Charlotte B. Carandang, college extension coordinator, with Prof. Julie Ann C. Lontoc and Prof. Joy M. Peji, DIT extension coordinators, discussed the extension programs that will help the community of Indang. One of the requested projects was the implementation of MIS to all the barangays. Upon approval and safety considerations, another set of discussion on this matter would be held with the barangay captains in the next session of the Sangguniang Bayan. This will cover the scope that will determine the applicability and further requirements of the system for deployment. Further, the team will also discuss the content of the memorandum of agreement.

Meanwhile, an inception meeting with Dr. Susan G. Tan, officer-in-charge of CvSU Gender and Development Resource Center (GAD RC), was held on March 9 together with Prof. Charlotte B. Carandang and Prof. Vanessa G. Coronado, CEIT MIS officers. The consultation ended with two major programs, namely: the development of IEC materials and video presentations of various laws and acts, and the development of a Referral System for the reporting of sexual harassment and other forms of abuse catering the CvSU employees and students as well as people outside CvSU. 
DIET extension program held last May 21, 2021



Upon her appointment as the ERB chairperson, Ms. Rint aims to ensure that all studies concerning human participants will undergo ethical reviews and that ethical issues are explored, decisions made are clear and recorded in accordance with the National Ethical Guidelines. Currently, she spearheads the revisions of the Standard Operating Procedures of ERB to augment the needs of the students and faculty researchers. In addition, Ms. Rint, along with the associate members, is currently working on its Level II accreditation status aiming to be recognized by the Philippine Health Research Ethics Board (PHREB).

### CvSU-CCAT conducts Go-Trace orientation-workshop

CvSU-CCAT conducted the Go-Trace orientation and workshop, led by Engr. Gee Jay C. Bartolome, director for Research and Extension of the campus, at the Santiago National High School (SNHS), Gen. Trias, Cavite on May 28, 2021. This program aimed to provide updates on COVID-19 cases in General Trias City with emphasis on the importance of contact tracing and proper orientation and workshop as to maximizing the utilization of Go-Trace application. SNHS was chosen as one of the adaptors of the said project

During the program, Engr. Bartolome welcomed the attendees and appreciated the warm acceptance of the principal, teachers, and staff of SNHS regarding the contact tracing application developed by the Research and Extension unit of CvSU-CCAT. He also gave an overview of the project and explained the primary purpose for its development and implementation.

Moreover, Ms. Mari Daisy O. Corral, faculty researcher of the CCAT Campus, presented the actual recorded COVID-19 cases in the City of Gen Trias totaling to 5,652 positive patients as of May 27, 267 of whom were considered active cases. She also mentioned the steps and protocols on how people can protect themselves from infection or spread of virus. Furthermore, Ms. Marie Michelle Castro, campus nurse of CvSU-CCAT, shared her expertise in elaborating the importance of contact tracing. She discussed the core principles of contact tracing that cover the management of confirmed cases and close

contacts to strengthen the knowledge of the beneficiaries and become readily equipped in handling the threats of the pandemic.

Orientation and workshop proper was conducted by Ms. Sheila Mae L. Gunio, faculty from the Department of Computer Studies. She clearly presented the step-by-step procedure on how a user can easily utilize the Go-Trace application as well as the process of managing the data collected by the contact tracing application. One of the participants asked if parents and students of SNHS could possibly use the said application. Ms. Gunio then clarified that this will also be part of the said project as CvSU - CCAT plans to extend the usability of the contact tracing app to all the stakeholders of the adaptor. All the participants were very cooperative during the workshop, as they really wanted to help the community to become more responsive in fighting against COVID-19.

To end the program, a certificate of appreciation was given to SNHS led by Ms. Laarnie R. Manuel, campus extension coordinator. The closing remarks were given by Ms. Cecilia C. Papa, SNHS principal. (*Xavier Lawrence D. Mendoza*)

The learning materials were transported to drop-off points accessible to the students. Retrieval of modules was another challenge but GMES teachers and BAELS faculty worked together to check the results of the answer sheets.

BAELS faculty members are currently preparing recorded video presentations of their lessons; hence, the beneficiaries would continuously be assisted during offline mode of learning. (Jocelyn A. Legaspi)

# CvSU-Carmona holds 3<sup>rd</sup> Student Research Congress

The Research Services Office of CvSU-Carmona Campus, through the initiative of Prof. Cristina M. Signo, campus administrator, and Mr. Carlo Emil B. Mañabo, campus research coordinator, held its 3<sup>rd</sup> Student Research Congress with the theme, "Research in the New Normal: Practical Research Methodologies for Continuous Community Development and Support", on May 27-28, 2021 via Cisco Webex. The congress aimed to continually improve and strengthen the research capabilities of the students, and provide additional knowledge on the research methodologies that they could adapt in this new learning arrangement. Moreover, this activity served as an avenue for students to present their research outputs and at the same time, learn new information and techniques from other presenters and invited paper evaluators.

On the first day of the congress, Dr. Melbourne R. Talactac, vice president for Research and Extension, delivered his keynote speech emphasizing the significance of research and its contribution to the community most especially in these trying times. He also encouraged students and faculty researchers to continue their passion in writing and conducting research projects even in this new normal. Dr. Miriam D. Baltazar, director for Research, and Dr. Almira G. Magcawas, Extension Services director, served as the resource speakers.

Dr. Baltazar discussed the different research funding opportunities inside and outside the university that may be considered by the students and the faculty researchers when planning for their research projects. To help Local Government Units (LGUs) to fine tune their Public Service announcements and manage their FB pages, the College of Arts and Sciences - Department of Communication (CAS-DComm) conducted a webinar series titled "KOMUNI-AKSYON: Epektibong komunikasyon tungo sa kolektibong aksyon" as part of its extension program. The initial session was held last June 04 which focused on the topic, "PSA: Paunawa. Serbisyo. Aksyon, Pagsulat ng epektibong Public Service Announcements para sa mga Local Government Unit". A total of 361 registered participants, 100 in Zoom and 211 views via Facebook Live, attended the session which include the Federation of Sangguniang Brgy. and Sangguniang Kabataan all over Cavite. Through these online platforms, the webinar series was also extended to the public.

Ms. Katherine Grace M. Garcia, LGOO III of the Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG) Batangas, was the first resource person for the session. Ms. Garcia talked about the importance of Identifying your Audience, Clarity, Ensuring Accuracy of Information, and Using the appropriate media platform in writing Public Service Announcements (I.C.E.U,).

Meanwhile, Mr. Xian Lerry G, Lozares, OIC of the Community Affairs Division of Gen Trias, Cavite, expressed during his lecture that, "Hindi sapat na maibigay lamang natin ang impormasyon, dapat ito ay nauunawaan, napamumuni at napakikilos ang ating mga kababayan at ang Komunikasyon ay maaaring makapagligtas o makapahamak, nawa ay piliin natin na marami tayong mailigtas at matulungan".

### **CAS-DPS** continues its webinar series

The Department of Physical Sciences of the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS-DPS) continued the conduct of its webinar series for 2021. The first of which was conducted last April 29.

Episode 2 titled, "Prioritizing Chemistry Concept in Secondary Education" was held on May 12. Dr. Hosea dL. Matel, associate professor from the DPS Chemistry unit, served as the resource speaker. He presented an action research during the webinar and emphasized on the difficulties encountered by the students in taking Chemistry. He started his talk with the definition of the term concept and its importance in teaching different subjects. He pointed out that one big hurdle in

understanding chemistry lies in not knowing the language of the subject which leads to difficulty in understanding the relationship between and among concepts. He also identified concepts in chemistry that are supposed to be discussed in general chemistry covered in secondary education. Moreover, he stressed that in designing a course, one should take note of the relevance of the concepts to be included, and should be within the prescribed curriculum, and applicable to the program or track.

He mentioned different techniques to help students understand the important concepts in Chemistry. "Teaching chemistry in a conceptual approach that empowers the students to be able to explain relations and predict outcomes, visualize and explain chemical concepts," Dr. Matel said.

Towards the end of the webinar, the participants requested that DPS offer training in Chemistry as most secondary education teachers are non-Chemistry majors. Prof. Rene Betonio, DPS chair, promised to look into the possibility of conducting such training.

The 3<sup>rd</sup> episode titled, "Error **Analysis** Pattern and Designing Remedial Intervention in Mathematics", was conducted on May 19. Prof. Andrew J. Siducon, DPS faculty member and currently, the extension coordinator of both DPS and CAS, started his talk by asking participants the question, "Which came first, error or misconception?". He mentioned that students' misconception

is manifested in a form of error. This happens when a person believes in a false concept, like believing that some mathematical concepts to be true but are in fact not. He stressed that educators should understand the students' misconception since they interfere with learning and that the misconception tends to be attached to the students unless corrected. He also presented different studies related to how students strongly hold on the misconception, its possible sources, and occurrence. He then listed some common mathematical misconceptions as well as their effects. Moreover, he talked about the concept of error analysis and how this may remedy conceptual difficulties encountered by the learners. He

mentioned that this is an assessment strategy that allows the educators to understand the students' procedure for solving computation and determine the consistency of the mistakes made by the students which will aid the educators in helping correct the students' misconceptions. He added that the most widely used model for error pattern analysis is the Newman theory. This model is used to analyze the students' errors and could be utilized to investigate students' required skills to answer problems. Likewise, he said that the model is applied when teachers want to investigate the students' consistent error in problem solving.

The basic structure or five steps of solving word problems in mathematics was also discussed. The error types, indicators, and suggested strategies were also emphasized. Different stages in problem solving where students encounter errors were also examined. In mitigating the errors, Prof. Siducon emphasized on the guidelines and provided the attendees with a template in Designing Remedial Intervention in Mathematics. He also advised attendees to develop an action research to come up with an acceptable intervention for their students' errors.

The last DPS webinar titled, "IP Ignite: An Awareness session on Intellectual Property", was held on May 26. Dr. Teddy F. Tepora, manager of the CvSU Innovations and Technology Support Office (ITSO) and project leader of the PCAARRD-funded IPM-BDO and Sustain IP-TBM projects, and Patent Mining Program for Selected AANR Commodities through Strengthened IP-TBM Offices, served as the resource speaker.

Dr. Tepora discussed the basics of intellectual property (IP). It started with the framework of the Philippine copyright system, what it covers, and the legal basis behind its creation. IP categories were explained, which include Industrial Property and copyright. The concept of copyright was discussed in detail. According to Dr. Tepora, copyright involves ideas and expression of thoughts. Copyrights

provide two types of rights: economic rights include rights that can be remunerated such as reproduction, transformation, first public distribution, rental, public display, public performance, and communication to the public, and moral rights that pertain to attribution on the authors' claim to the right to have authorship recognized and the right to integrity of the work which include their right to stop the reproduction of their work if they choose to

In terms of ownership of the copyright, economic rights can be assigned in full or in part to the assignee while moral rights remain with the creator(s). He also discussed the process involved on how one obtains copyright as well as the extent of aid the university offers to its personnel in obtaining the same.

All the webinars lasted for over an hour and reached over 21 provinces in the Philippines and a total of 529 participants via Google meet and Facebook live. These could also be accessed through the DPS Extension and Research Unit Facebook page. (Lynn G. Penales)

#### Organic seedling bags from banana peel wins at CvSU-LSHS Research Forum

The research paper titled, "Organic Seedling Bags made from Banana Peels as Additional Soil Fertilizer" authored by Christian James B. Delos Santos, Lara Sophia N. Ramos, and Vince Elijah R. Rom of the Cavite State University - Laboratory Science High School (CvSU-LSHS), together with their mentor, Mr. Junser P. Magpantay, won in the research capstone category during the CvSU-LSHS Research Forum held on June 8 via Google Meet. The panel of evaluators were Dr. Liza C. Costa, CvSU-LSHS principal, Mr. Rufriel S. Mesa, CvSU-LSHS research coordinator, and Mr. Antonio V. Cinto, faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences-Department of Physical Sciences (CAS-DPS).

With the increase in the number of individuals who want to grow plants and vegetables in their backyards, also known as "Plantitos and Plantitas", their research capstone aimed to produce an organic seedling bag using banana peels. Their study also aimed to lessen the environmental pollution caused by single-used plastics such as polyethylene seedling bags that are most commonly used in seed/plant propagation. According to the presenters, the thought of using banana peels as a medium of their organic seedling bags came up since the Philippines is one of the producers of banana.
