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Sex Disaggregated Data of Students by College, 1st Semester AY 2018-2019

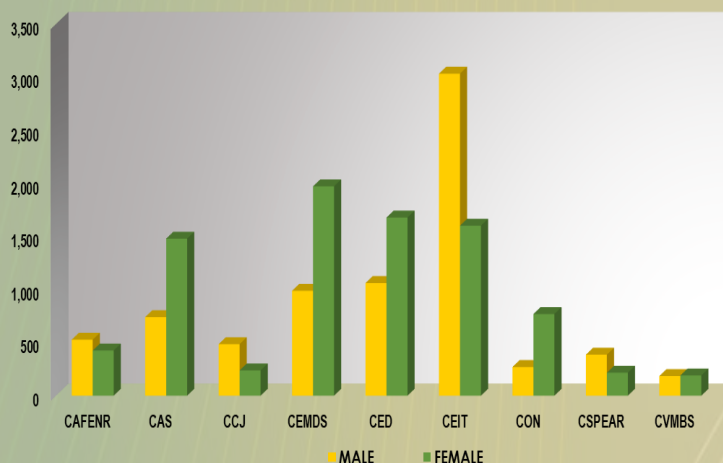


Figure 1. Sex disaggregated of enrolment of students by college, 1st semester, AY 2018-2019

The issue of gender stereotyping is still present in the enrolment of undergraduate students in the different colleges of the university during the 1st semester of AY 2018-2019. Female students in the College of Arts and Sciences; College of Economics, Management, and Development Studies; College of Education; and College of Nursing outnumber male students. However, male students dominated in the College of Agriculture, Food, Environment, and Natural Resources; College of Criminal Justice; College of Engineering and Information Technology; College of Sports, Physical Education and Recreation; and College of Veterinary Medicine and Biomedical Sciences. The result is consistent with the trend in enrolment in 2017-2018 (Student Factsheet, 2017-2018) (Figure 1).

Cavite State University, together with the Office of Student Affairs and Services, conducted a Leadership Seminar cum Student Organization Recognition with the theme "Excellency in Leadership for Global University 2020" on September 10, 2019 at the International Convention Center. The participants were composed of student leaders/officers and advisers of the different organizations.

The Gender and Development Resource Center of the university held its 4th Gender and Development Research Conference with 13 male and 33 female participants. The conference aims to identify innovative and relevant research results for presentation and publication; appreciate the presentation of researches on GAD; and select and award the best papers on GAD.

This 4th research conference in addition to completed researches, on-going and proposed researches were also evaluated. Five on-going, five projects under the program "Gender Role Differentiation Across Various Sectors in the province of Cavite, Philippines" were able to

present by their respective project leaders. As regard, ten reports were presented. One research proposal of graduate student was also evaluated.

Ms. Monette S. Santos, Member, National GAD Resource Pool, Philippine Commission on Women and Ms. Almira G. Magcawas, former Director of the Continuing Education and Training Services and a faculty researcher of the College of Economics, Management and Developmental Studies, CvSU served as evaluators of the completed and proposed research papers while Dr. Evelyn O. Singson, Head, Monitoring and Evaluation Division, Research Center,

CvSU and Dr. Marietta C. Mojica, GAD Chair for Research served as evaluators of the on-going researches during the said activity.

After the deliberation, the research study

entitled *Regional Analysis of Gender Wage Gap of Private Employment in the Philippines* written by Ms. Joan Marie G. Albis and Ms. Marie E. Silud won the Best Paper Award. (RAEstebat)

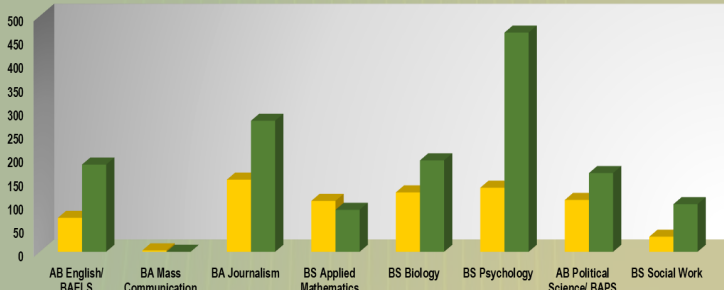


Figure 4 . Enrolment in the College of Arts and Sciences

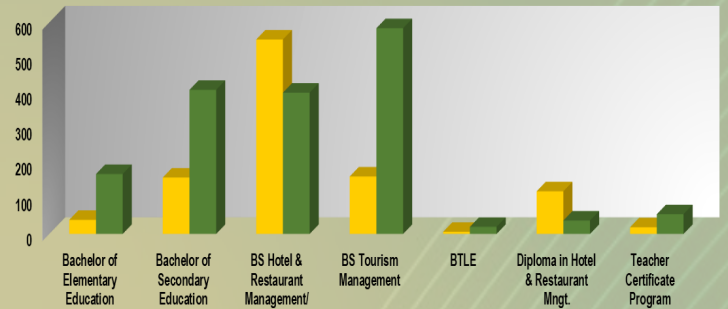


Figure 5 . Enrolment in the College of Education

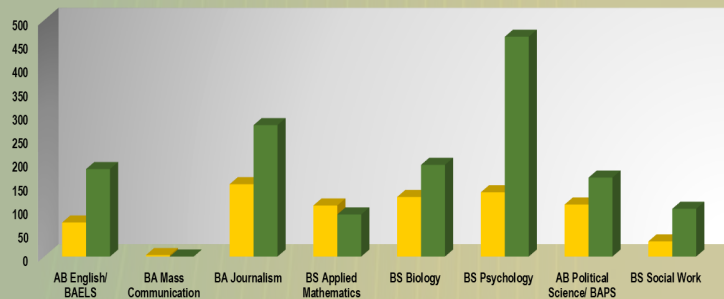


Figure 6 . Enrolment in the College of Economics, Management, and Development

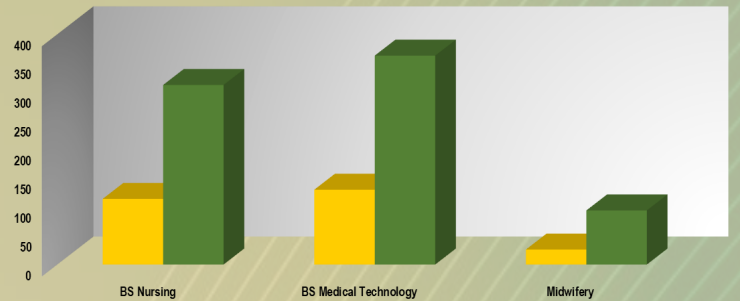


Figure 7 . Enrolment in the College of Nursing

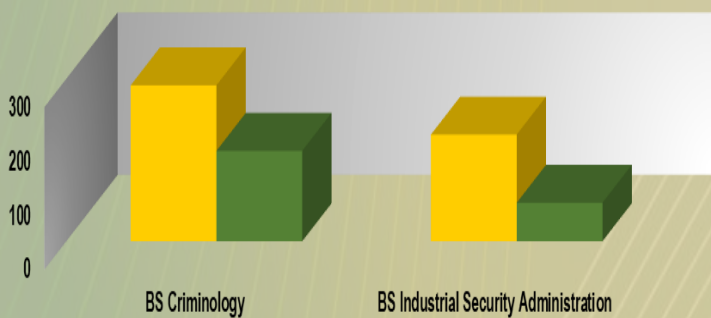


Figure 8 . Enrolment in the College of Criminal Justice

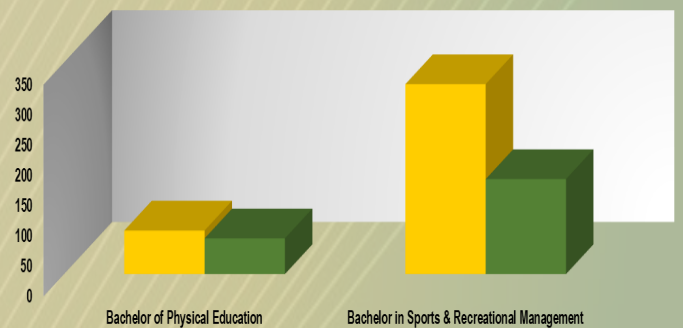


Figure 9 . Enrolment in the College of Sports, Physical Education,

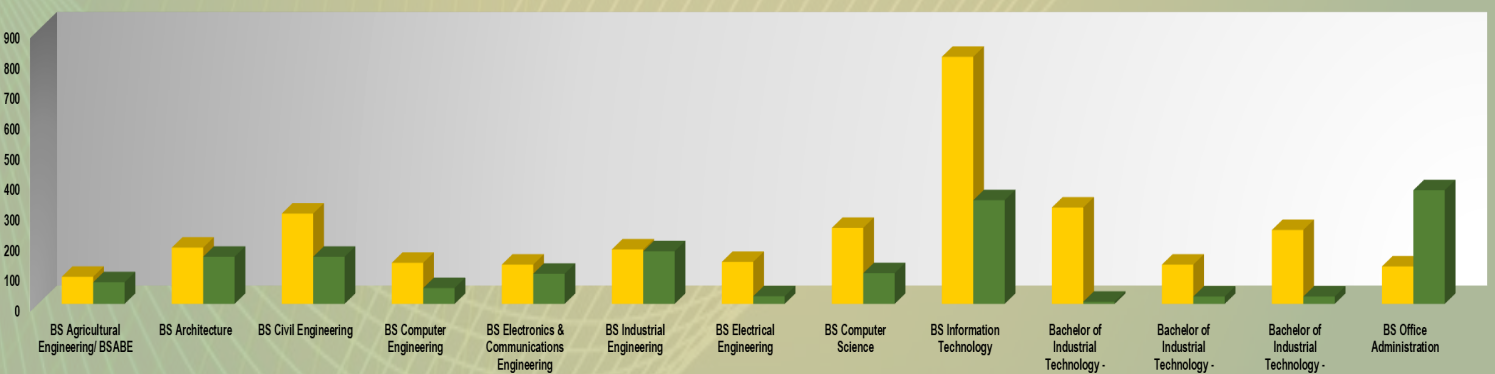


Figure 10 . Enrolment in the College of Engineering and Information Technology

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
