AD Scientific Index names Talactac as Top-Cited Scientist

Dr. Melbourne R. Talactac, CvSU vice president for Research and Extension and faculty of the College of Veterinary Medicine and Biomedical Sciences (CVMBS), was named Top-Cited Scientist in the January 29, 2022 edition of the Alper-Dodger (AD) Scientific Index, a ranking system with a methodology based on the principle of including only meritorious scientists. Dr. Talactac earned such honour particularly for the study titled, "Mucosal Immunization with Recombinant Influenza Hemagglutinin Protein and Poly Gamma-glutamate/chitosan Nanoparticles Induces Protection Against Highly Pathogenic Influenza A Virus", published in 2012 with 44 citations as per Google Scholar to date.

Dr. Talactac was recognized as one of the 12 Outstanding Young Scientists by the National Academy of Science and Technology and Philippine Veterinary Medical Association's Outstanding Veterinarian in Education in 2020 and is currently working on influenza virus studies under Dr. Richard J. Webby of St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee as a Fulbright Visiting Scholar. (continue on page 2)


KTTO collaborates with OVPRE, KMC on tech transfer webinar

The Knowledge and Technology Transfer Office (KTTO) collaborated with the Knowledge Management Center (KMC) and Office of the Vice President for Research and Extension (OVPRE) in the conduct of the webinar titled, "The Role of Technology Transfer in the University" held last November 25, 2021 via Cisco Webex and streamed on Facebook Live. The activity aimed to provide students, faculty, and staff with an introduction and concepts of technology transfer for a better understanding of the importance and benefits of transferring technology owned by the University.

Dr. Agnes C. Francisco, KMC director, welcomed the participants while Dr. Melbourne R. Talactac, vice president for Research and Extension, delivered an inspirational message and encouraged the participants not to stop with their researches after submitting terminal reports but rather develop them further and transfer the knowledge and technology to broader audience for applications. A short audio-video presentation showcasing CvSU -owned technologies followed. Meanwhile, Engr. Sheryl Dinglasan- Fenol, KTTO manager, introduced Dr. Jonathan W.L. Salvacion, director for Directed Research for Innovation and Value Enhancement at Mapúa University, who served as the resource speaker.

Dr. Salvacion, in his talk, emphasized that even the most ingenious research would not impact the lives of the broader audience unless the research is transformed into products and services useful to the public. He further cited some classic examples of technological transfer such as PAP smear, pacemakers, and seatbelts. "The role of technology transfer in a

university is to capture value from Intellectual Property and license them, provide expertise, foster collaboration between researchers, and create policies and procedures on technology transfer." Dr. Salvacion said. He also mentioned the possible rewards for the university for establishing a Knowledge and Technology Transfer Office such as promotion of culture of innovation and entrepreneurship among the students and faculty, and opportunity for academic work to have additional positive impact.

Lastly, Dr. Teddy F. Tepora, head of the Intellectual Property Management Division (IPMD) and manager of the Intellectual Transfer and Support Office (ITSO), thanked everyone for attending and actively participating in the webinar. Talactac shares expertise on research publication

Dr. Melbourne R. Talactac, vice president for Research and Extension, shared his expertise on research publication in a webinar titled, "Advocate, Nurture and Sustain a Strong Culture of Research and Foster Academe-Community Partnership" sponsored by the Taguig City University last January 26 via Zoom video conferencing.

Dr. Talactac, a firm believer in the publish or perish ideology, told the participants that a new knowledge, invention, or discovery through research, unless written and published, is a waste because publishing a research, though a privilege, is also hard work. He emphasized that lack of confidence, fear of failure or rejection, and even fear towards editors and reviewers hinder researchers in publishing their works. He, then, shared different tips and tricks on how to successfully publish articles. He said that everything starts from believing in oneself and being confident in what one does because it will reflect in the manuscript. He also mentioned that collaborating with fellow researchers greatly helps in writing since two minds would always be better than one. He further said that self-rejection and non-submission of the manuscript after undergoing a peer-review would not help the researcher to publish his/her paper. "The key in publication is working your way from starting small and continuously doing research," he said.



He further explained the purpose of scrutiny or criticism from reviewers and editors. He added that one's expertise and experience as seen online help in the publication of articles.

Lastly, he discussed the importance of preparing and selecting the journal to be published to learn more about the journal, its background, and guidelines. Using proper software and tools in editing and having a friend would help polish the paper before submitting it. (Gierone Lianni A. Reyes)



Trainees Mark Profeta and Marlou Profeta, participants, relayed this opportunity to their farm workers and other relatives including Magsasaka Siyentista Marlo Profeta. Mark Profeta, a public school teacher, owns a farm in Tanza which his family calls, "Bukiring Mayumi". Established in the said farm were five colonies of stingless bees which then served as part of the hands-on training in the afternoon.

Ms. Michele T. Bono and Mr. Dickson N. Dimero served as resource persons for the said activity. They discussed the nature of stingless bees, the techniques in managing colonies, and the economic side of the said technology. They were accompanied and assisted by Ms. Sherine M. Cruzate and Ms. Jamaica Q. Espineli, faculty from the Department of Biological Sciences of the College of Arts and Sciences.

GADRC conducts Refresher Training Workshop on MOVE KATROPA

In support to ending gender-based violence, the Gender refresher training workshop on Men Opposed to Violence Against Women Everywhere (MOVE) and Kalalakihang Tapat sa Responsibilidad at Obligasyon sa Pamilya (KATROPA) last February 8-10 via Zoom video conferencing to revitalize the commitments of the GAD champions. The activity drew over 113 people from different colleges, satellite campuses, and units of Cavite State University.

On behalf of Dr. Hernando D. Robles, university president, Dr. Ma. Agnes P. Nuestro, vice president for Academic Affairs, welcomed and reminded the participants on their respective roles and responsibilities as officers and trainers of MOVE KATROPA. Moreover, she told the participants that she expects them to increase their standards and attain greatness.

On the first day, Mr. Ronaldo A. Amora, Social Welfare Officer II of the Department of Social and Welfare Development (DSWD) Field Office IV-A, shared the current Violence Against Women (VAW) situation and discussed DSWD's objectives and programs. Mr. Amora encouraged men to become partners with women and work together to establish safe communities for all and mentioned how power is ingrained in social ties. Moreover, he elaborated on what gives someone power and who has power in the community, and ended with a remark from Secretary-General Ban Ki-Moon, who stated that VAW is never acceptable, never excusable, and never tolerable.

Mr. Amora highlighted patriarchal ideology, masculinity and and Development Resource Center (GADRC) conducted a sexual potency, the journey of becoming a man, patriarchy, and the change of the Filipino male. He underlined that patriarchy is a system in which both men and women participate. Likewise, he emphasized that males are victims of Gender-Based Violence and reinforced this point with images and videos.

> On the second day, Mr. King David J. Agreda, president of CvSU MOVE KATROPA and GAD coordinator of Cavite City Campus, gave the recap of day 1 activity. He provided a clear opportunity for the participants to examine their hearts as GAD advocates and to ceaselessly ensure that equity and violence-free communities will prevail. He emphasized that Gender-Based Violence is a societal cancer that is more widespread than the emerging coronavirus known as COVID-19 and has a greater impact on women and girls than on men and boys. He assured everyone that the organization will continue to encourage male involvement in the advocacy aimed at ending violence against women and emphasizing a larger and stronger movement for gender equality and social justice.

said that violence may be reduced if men serve as positive role models for other men and their children, take on leadership responsibilities, and engage in local community activities that promote awareness and support for the eradication of VAWC. Mr. Bunao underlined that fathers are the greatest source of strength for a kid. He recalled General Colin Powell who said, "Behind a great individual, we frequently discover the legacy of a loving parent." *The purpose of fatherhood is to light a fire in the lives of his children.*" Moreover, he shared the history of MOVE, KATROPA, and Empowerment and Reaffirmation of Paternal Abilities (ERPAT).

On the third day, Mr. Ariel R. Rivera, Secretary of KATROPA and GAD coordinator of CvSU Naic Campus, gave the recap of day 2 activity. He shared the knowledge he gathered from the second session such as the lecture about men which increased his understanding on ERPAT; the duties of fathers, men's obligations and good parenting; how fathers develop gender sensitivity, appreciation, and partnership with their spouses as well as promoting and enhancing family life by enhancing and strengthening a positive satisfying marital partnership; preventing domestic violence, promoting shared parenthood, and planning family size; establishing a network among fathers in the community; increasing fathers' active participation and involvement such as becoming aware of their

role, promoting and understanding different forms of violence against women and children as well as other forms of genderbased violence.

Meanwhile, Mr. Harold M. David, Information Officer II of the Commission on Population and Development CALABARZON, spoke about sexuality which is a vital component of who men are. He mentioned that sexuality allows men to have a more responsible connection by deepening recognition and acceptance of their existence. He also highlighted a healthy lifestyle for men by avoiding vices such as cigarettes and alcohol, as well as stress and tension. Likewise, he shared that beautification of marriage or partnership is the secret to a long-lasting relationship, the importance of man caring for his spouse or partner for a healthy pregnancy which is an important guarantee to rescue women from the mortality that comes with childbirth. Furthermore, he discussed man's role as a decent father. He talked about family planning, the capacity to prepare ahead of time and have the desired number of children spaced correctly, listed the advantages of family planning and its many methods. Lastly, he reiterated how KATROPA can be promoted.




