SEX DISAGGREGATED DATA OF STUDENTS BY COLLEGE




Figure 1. Shows data on Students' enrollment per college for the first semester, categorized by gender, with males on the left and females on the right.


FIRST SEMESTER, A.Y 2020 - 2021


The landscape of enrollment for the first semester of the academic year 2020-2021 at the main campus of Cavite State University still exhibits a clear dominance of male students. This dominance is particularly evident in the College of Agriculture, Food, Environment, and Natural Resources (CAFENR), the College of Criminal Justice (CCJ), the College of Engineering and Information Technology (CEIT), and the College of Sports, Physical Education, and Recreation (CSPEAR), where the number of male enrollees significantly surpasses that of their female counterparts.

It is worth noting an advancement occurring in various educational institutions, particularly in the sphere of accommodating a larger population of female students. This development is particularly evident in colleges such as the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS), the College of Economics, Management, and Development Studies (CEMDS), the College of Education (CED), the College of Nursing (CON), and the College of Veterinary Medicine and Biomedical Sciences (CVMBS). As a result, it reflects a consistent pattern aligning with the trend observed in the enrollment data for the academic year 2019– 2020, as documented in the student factsheet for the same academic year (2019–2020).

SECOND SEMESTER, A.Y 2020 - 2021

During the process of registration for the second semester of the academic year 2020-2021, it was noted that the outcomes mirrored those of the preceding registration period for the initial semester. Specifically, it was observed that the College of Agriculture, Food, Environment, and Natural Resources (CAFENR), the College of Criminal Justice (CCJ), the College of Engineering and Information Technology (CEIT), and the College of Sports, Physical Education, and Recreation (CSPEAR) exhibited a predominant male student population. Conversely, the Colleges of Arts and Sciences (CAS), College of Education (CED), College of Nursing (CON), and College of Veterinary Medicine and Biomedical Sciences (CVMBS) were characterized by a significant presence of female students.






GI BUSTERS ONLINE MEETING AND ELECTION

On February 19, 2021, in line with the GAD plan of strengthening the implementation of gender mainstreaming, the Gender and Development Unit organized an online meeting and election for the establishment of the first gender-based student organization. The organization aims for gender justice and works towards realizing a campus free of gender bias and discrimination, gender oppression, and gender violence.

The meeting and election were attended by 21 student leaders (12 male and 11 female students).

The activity aimed to identify those student leaders who will be exposed to gender and development advocacy and train these students in promoting equality.




WOMAN IN EDUCATION

Figure 6. ENROLLMENT IN THE COLLEGE OF EDUCATION


